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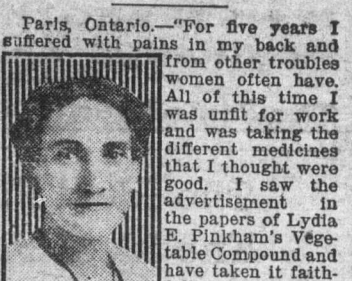

the wedding.

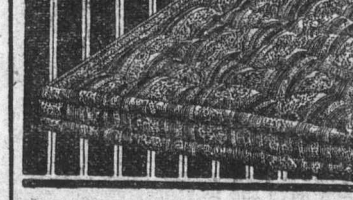
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LAD GETS BEYOND DEPTH; MEN ANSWER HIS CRIES FOR HELP

Hearing cries for help coming from
the bathing beach at the Walkerville
ferry dock, Archibald Remillard, 326
Pierre avenue, and Victor Brown,
816 St. Germain street, London, leaped
into the water Saturday afternoon
and rescued Clarence R. Leacock,
nine years old, of 277 Lincoln road,
son of Russell J. Leacock.

According to witnesses, the boy
waded out beyond his depth with the
aid of piles beneath the dock. Los-
ing his grip, the boy sank, crying
for help at the same time. Remillard
and Brown, who were on the dock at
the time, both jumped into the water
near the spot where they had seen
the boy disappear. The boy was un-
conscious and going down for the
last time, when Remillard managed to
grasp his body. Hastily carrying
the boy to the beach, Remillard ren-
dered first aid to the unconscious
lad. Walkerville police answering a
call to the ferry dock, found the boy
still unconscious. They succeeded in
reviving him and took him to his
home on Lincoln road.

Clarence, according to his mother,
desired Saturday to go bathing at
the Walkerville park beach. Con-
sidering the terrific heat, although
he could not swim, he was allowed
to go. Within an hour after his de-
parture from his home he was
brought back again by the Walker-
ville police. Although only nine years
old, the boy is in the entrance class
at King George School, and is
thought by his mother to have de-
sired to master the art of swimming
when he went beyond his depth Sat-
urday afternoon.

Fully recovered this morning,
Clarence went to school, apparently
not suffering from the effects of the
near tragedy.

Remillard and Brown, who figured
in the brilliant rescue, are now be-
ing sought by the parents of the boy.
The whereabouts in the Border Cities
of Brown, are at present not known.

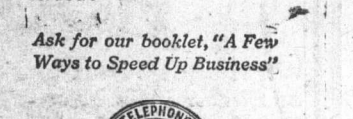
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
