ANAPOLIS AND KINGS CO.'S EXHIBITION FOR 1903. Greatest Show of Fruit Ever Seen in Nova Scotia.

Opened by J. W. Langley at Two O'clock Tuesday.

An agricultural exhibition, the first for many years to be held in Bridgetown, is now in full swing here.

The Annapolis and Kings Co's exhibition has been favored by one of the most fruitful seasons on record, and while we hope to see the present exhibition surpassed by some of the accompanying accessories of future events, we can scarcely hope for more to come to see the present exhibit.

Shortly before two o'clock the band of Patten & Perry, engaged by the committee for the exhibition, marched to the grounds and rendered a number of selections in the open air.
