## ORIGINAL COMMUNICATMONS.

Valedictory Address to the Graduates in Medicine and Surgery McGill University. Delivered on behalf of the Medical Faculty, at the An nual Conrocation held in the William Molson Hatl of the University, on the 3rd May, 1867. By George W. Campbell, A. M., M D., Professor of Surgery, and Dean of the Medical Faculty.

Gentlemen Graduates:
The connexion which has for so many years existed between us as teachers and students being now about to be for ever severed, it is customary on taking leave of you to address to you a ferw words of congratulation and advice, but I hope I may be allowed before doing so, to dwell for a short time upon a subject which, although in a measure persenal to us as the Faculty of Medicine of Mcaill University, is not the less interesting and important to you, now commencing life for yourselves, and from your education and position in the community, about to exercise, I hope for the public weal, no inconsiderable influence upon public opinion.
You are most of you, no doubt aware, that since 1st of January, 1866, the Profession in Upper Canada has been governed by an Act, entitled "An Act to regulate the qualifications of Practitioners in Medicine and and Surgery in Upper Canada," and that under this Act a council has been established, composed partly of representatives chosen, one from each of the four Universities: one from the Toronto School of Medicine, and one from each of the twelve Electoral Divisions of Upper Canada. The body so selected, is styled the General Council of Medical Education and Registration of Upper Canada. To this Act, as at first passed, the McGill College authorities offered no opposition, it was regarded by them as a Tery excellent measure ; liberal in its provision, and a just and sufficient protection to the properly qualified Medical Practitioner. By it, Licen-㮃tiates of Medicine in Upper and Lower Canada, and persons holding me-娄dical or Surgical Degrees or Diplomas from any University in Her Ma-
