

The Secretary of State for External Affairs, the Honourable Mitchell Sharp, announced that Mr. Napoléon LeBlanc, Canadian member of UNESCO's Executive Board and past chairman of the Canadian Commission for UNESCO, will preside over the Canadian delegation at the 17th Session of the General Conference of the United Nations Organization for Education, Science and Culture (UNESCO). The two vice-presidents will be the Honourable G. L. Bennett, Minister of Education of Prince Edward Island, and Mr. J.-L. Gagnon, Canadian Ambassador and Permanent Delegate to UNESCO.

This conference, which is convened every two years will be held at the permanent headquarters of UNESCO in Paris from October 17 to November 18, 1972. Representatives from over one hundred and twenty-five countries will discuss the two-year and the five-year programmes of UNESCO in such fields as education, exact and natural sciences, social science, humanities, culture and communications.
