# CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS

PROVISION FOR AUTHORIZATION TO MAKE CAPITAL EXPENDITURES, TO ISSUE SECURITIES, ETC.

Hon. Alphonse Fournier (for the Minister of Finance) moved the second reading of Bill No. 45, to authorize the provision of moneys to meet certain commitments for new equipment incurred by the Canadian National Railways system during the calendar year 1951, and to authorize the guarantee by His Majesty of certain securities to be issued by the Canadian National Railways.

Mr. Macdonnell (Greenwood): May we have an explanation?

Mr. W. M. Benidickson (Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Transport): Mr. Speaker, while this bill stands in the name of the Minister of Finance (Mr. Abbott) it concerns the financing of Canadian National Railways, so perhaps I could give the explanation. The short title is Canadian National Railways Financing and Guarantee Act (No. 2), 1951. Hon. members may ask why there is a second act of this type this year.

The house will recall that the annual Canadian National Railways financing bill passed at the first session of this year contained an unusual clause which permitted the Canadian National Railways, subject to the approval of the governor in council, to make commitments in 1951 for the purchase of equipment which it was not expected would be delivered in 1951, but in 1952 or perhaps later. Orders could not be placed without government authority. On June 19, 1951, I placed on *Hansard* a list of the equipment for which commitments were to be authorized; the total amount of the commitments was not to exceed \$111,512,920.

The house will realize that normally this financing and guarantee act comes to it in May or June of the usual session. We are now informed that some of this equipment will be delivered sooner than expected and prior to June 30 next year. The present bill simply provides that the usual guarantees can be given for the financing of this equipment to the extent of \$55,581,816, which it is expected is the value of the equipment that
