

**Mr. J. A. Jerome (Parliamentary Secretary to President of the Privy Council):** 1. Yes, and the Department of Transport endeavours to give some preference to shippers of perishable products at ports in P.E.I. where frost-proof transit sheds are located, but the general public and other shippers also have a right to request and be given the use of space in the sheds.

2. The Department of Transport endeavours to give some preference to shippers of potatoes when considering renting of space in the frost-proof transit sheds.

NUMBER OF INDIANS, ESKIMOS AND METIS HIRED BY  
PANARCTIC OILS LTD.

Question No. 1,437—**Mr. Yewchuk:**

1. For each of the past three years, how many jobs have been provided by Panarctic Oils Ltd. to (a) Indians (b) Eskimos (c) Metis?

2. During the past ten years, how many (a) Indians (b) Eskimos (c) Metis received training from the government to work in the oil industry in the North?

**Hon. Jean Chrétien (Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development):** 1. 1968-69, 6 Eskimos; 1969-70, 6 Eskimos; 1970-71, 8 Eskimos.

2. From 1968-69 to 1970-71 inclusive, 80 residents of the Northwest Territories received training from the government in this regard. Statistics are not kept on an ethnic basis and no figures are available prior to 1968-69.

AMENDMENT OF MANPOWER RETRAINING REGULATIONS  
TO PROVIDE FOR "IN-PLANT" TRAINING

Question No. 1,505—**Mr. Robinson:**

Will the government advise if it is prepared to amend the regulations for Manpower re-training so that "in-plant training" can take place under the program?

**Hon. Otto E. Lang (Minister of Manpower and Immigration):** Under Section 6 of the Adult Occupational Training Act the Department of Manpower and Immigration now participates in "in-plant training" through its Training-in-Industry Program. This program provides support for the employer's training of his employees, with special emphasis given to the prevention of lay-offs, and the training of new employees recruited from among the unemployed.

**Mr. Carter:** Mr. Speaker, I wonder if the parliamentary secretary would endeavour to obtain answers to question No. 933 of February 11 and question No. 1,013 of February 23.

DAIRY COMMISSION CONTRACTS WITH COOPÉRATIVE  
AGRICOLE OF GRANBY AND VERMETTE ET FILS OF  
SAINT-AGAPIT

That an Order of the House do issue for a copy of all contracts signed between the Canadian Dairy Commission and the *Coopérative Agricole* of Granby and between *Vermette et Fils* of Saint-Agapit for the storing of butter in the warehouses of these two companies, as well as the documents or bills concerning the payments made by the Canadian Dairy Commission to these two companies during the fiscal years 1969-70 and 1970-71 for storage of the butter.

**Mr. J. A. Jerome (Parliamentary Secretary to President of the Privy Council):** Mr. Speaker, there are no contracts for butter storage between the Canadian Dairy Commission and the *Coopérative Agricole* of Granby and *Vermette et Fils* of Saint-Agapit. Payments to these firms for butter storage are at prevailing commercial storage rates. It has not been the practice to release financial details of individual firms as requested by the hon.
