HEALTH AND WELFARE—CIGARETTE ADVERTISEMENTS IN QUEBEC

Question No. 584-Mr. Cossitt:

- 1. Did the Department of National Health and Welfare place warnings on cigarette advertisements in transportation systems in Quebec, specifically in the metro or in buses in Montreal and, if so (a) at what cost (b) were the warnings printed in the French language only and, if so, for what reason (c) does the government who advocates two official languages, consider itself bound by any Quebec legislation in regard to unilingual advertisements and, if so, for what reasons and on what grounds?
- 2. If such cigarette advertisements were placed by tobacco companies and not the government, what are all the reasons that the government does not insist that the warning regarding health and cigarettes be printed in the two official languages?

Hon. Monique Bégin (Minister of National Health and Welfare): In so far as the Department of National Health and Welfare is concerned:—

- 1. No. The Department of National Health and Welfare did not place warnings on cigarette advertisements in transportation systems in Quebec. (a) Not applicable; (b) Not applicable; (c) Not applicable.
- 2. Cigarette advertisements are placed by the tobacco companies in accordance with the requirements of province of Quebec language legislation.

CANADA SAVINGS BONDS—ADVERTISEMENT IN QUEBEC

Question No. 585—Mr. Cossitt:

Did the Department of Finance place advertisements for Canada Savings Bonds in transportation systems in Quebec, specifically in the metro or in buses in Montreal and, if so (a) at what cost (b) were the advertisements printed in the French language only and, if so, for what reason (c) does the government who advocates two official languages, consider itself bound by any Quebec legislation in regard to unilingual advertisements and, if so, for what reasons and on what grounds?

Hon. Jean Chrétien (Minister of Finance):

- (a) Yes, the Department of Finance did authorize Canada Savings Bond advertisements in transportation systems in Quebec and these advertisements were placed only in the metro and buses in Montreal. The total cost of these advertisements was \$18,189.
- (b) The advertisements were printed in the French language only, as has been the practice since this form of advertising was first used for CSBs in 1973. Each year the CSB advertising has incorporated a separate French and English campaign
