CANADA POST CORPORATION ACT

MEASURE TO AMEND

Mr. Bob Speller (Haldimand—Norfolk) moved for leave to introduce Bill C-346, an act to amend the Canada Post Corporation Act.

He said: Mr. Speaker, I would like to introduce in the House today a Private Members Bill which seeks to repeal subsection 13(5) of the Canada Post Corporation Act.

This subsection is discriminatory to rural route carriers in that it prevents them from the enjoyment of rights by excluding them from the employee status as provided for in the Canada Labour Code.

These route carriers provide a most valuable service to 1.2 million households in Canada by providing vital communication and contact to the people in rural and often isolated communities. I believe it is unacceptable that rural route carriers, whose hours after long and hard work, who often in our northern climate face the most treacherous of conditions, should be denied the most basic employee rights.
