OTTAWA WOMAN NOT AVERSE TO BLOODSHED

OTTAWA, Feb. 21.—Miss Lulu Abbott, secretary of the Ottawa Woman's Suffrage Association in an interview today, said: "I hope Mrs. Pankhurst and her followers will not have to resort to shedding human blood, but if I were in England and found it necessary to do so, I would not hesitate. At present we have no need to resort to militancy in Canada, but if we had been trying to get the vote for over 50 years by constitutional methods, and had received no satisfaction, then militancy here would be justified. I don't believe that militancy is alienating the sympathy of the general public in Great Britain."

HYDRO POPULAR IN GALT.

GUELPH RAILWAY TO CUT CIVIC DEFICIT

GUELPH, Feb. 21.—(Special.)—Col. A. H. MacDonald, secretary of the Guelph Junction Railway Board, has received a cheque for \$11,162 from the C.P.R., being the city's share of the last quarter's earnings of the G.J.R. This material increase over what was anticipated means that the deficit in last year's civic finances, which was placed at over \$3000, will now be reduced to about \$1500. This is accounted for by the fact that only \$9000 was estimated as the revenue for the quarter.

It is claimed that the steady growth in the revenue from the city's utility will fully justify an estimate of \$40,000 in this year's receipts from the Guelph Junction Railway, a very material term towards the reduction of the city's tax rate.

GOVERNMENT KILLED MEASURE WHICH ROWELL UNEXPECTEDLY SPRANG IN THE LEGISLATURE

Opposition Leader Tried to Block Second Reading of Act Respecting Labor in Factories and Shops, Which He Dubbed Antiquated, by Introducing Amendment—Not Half of the Members Voted on It.

It was indeed a surprise that N. W. Rowell sprang on the government in the legislature yesterday. Not satisfied with the provisions in the revised act respecting factories, office buildings and shops, introduced by Hon. S. Duff, he attempted to hold back its second reading. In doing so he brought about a division of the house, which was an unexpected occurrence for a Friday, as many of the members leave their parliamentary duties to return to their homes for the week and after a speech criticizing the government for bringing down an "antiquated measure," Mr. Rowell moved the following: "This bill will be not read a second time, but that it be resolved that it is the duty of the government to immediately introduce a measure embodying modern principles of factory regulations and inspection, so as to more effectively safeguard the lives, health and physical and mental well-being of the men, women and children employed in the factories and shops."

Surprise to Premier to exasperated at the introduction of the amendment. It is the purpose of the hon. member to bring the act on the amendment? he asked, to which Mr. Rowell replied in the affirmative. "It is the duty of all the members on both sides of the house to give careful consideration to all legislation," said Sir James, "I do not wish to object to what my hon. colleague put forward. But I wonder under what circumstances the hon. member would admit that the government had ever done anything that was right. He at least would never do it consciously. This motion is indeed a surprise. I don't care whether or not the act is up to date with other countries. So long as it is up to date with common sense, I'm satisfied. There is no country in the world where there is as little to complain of in regard to conditions of labor surrounding children. It seems to suit the hon. member to exaggerate and multiply, it suits him to point out that in this favored land of ours the labor conditions are such that call for more legislation. I defy him to show proof. This bill should pass its second reading. The hon. gentleman has taken a course which is certainly unheard of. An amendment comes down in an unusual way after that 'detestable revision committee' has brought the present act merely up to date. Instead of amending it he takes an unheard-of course of stopping its second reading. Why does he not introduce a bill himself?"

When the vote was called for there were just 44 members, less than one-half the entire roll, in the house, and the government swamped the Rowell amendment 28 to 8.

Points Out Duties. Then Sam Clarke, Liberal for West Northumberland, entered the debate and took occasion to point out to Hon. Mr. Duff some of his duties. "An minister of agriculture he is held responsible for all matters in connection with agriculture," he said. "There is no doubt that he knew that the proposition to bring out settlers and sell them land was on foot. And there is no doubt that the settlers were misled, the minister of agriculture having stated that they were recompensed. There is only 25 per cent. of the land of Ontario under cultivation, and we are striving for settlers for the undeveloped districts, and I contend that it is up to the minister of agriculture to guard every settler after his rights. He should have dug up the entire history of this company and shown to the world that Ontario is not open to such exploitations."

Mr. Rowell then read the premier's statement regarding the affair, which was published some time ago. According to the Liberal leader this statement inferred that a settler should look over his land before assuming his obligation. "He declared, would tend to retard the investment of English capital. 'The minister of agriculture should have investigated thoroughly this case and exposed those who were guilty, if there were any such. We should not seek to keep British capital in our land and attract rather than repel it.'"

Same Old Story. Sir James intimated that the minister of agriculture deserved every credit for treating the Kent County settlers the way they were treated. "We should receive, as it was in the habit of receiving the encomiums of the people. 'The same old story,' said Mr. Clarke. "The papers will show that the department was blameless," concluded the premier.

Bill Ruled Out. The legislature had no sooner opened its afternoon session than a skirmish took place between the premier and the leader of the opposition, N. W. Rowell was the first man in his hand. He had a notice in his hand which seemed to give him trouble, and immediately began to express his disappointment that the bill should be an act for raising money on the credit of


