

Copper Miners Promise to Obey Law-Grand Jury Investigation.

MARCUS LOEW DUPLEX THEATRE IS EXPRESSION OF A BIGIDEA

The name of Marcus Leow is per-haps not so well known in Canada as in the United States, but there is no doubt that it will be in the near future. A man who had the courage to come into Toronto and select the most expensive site upon which a theatre could be built; a site on the east side of Yonge street, just north of Queen; a site in the very heart of the shop-ping district; a site of enormous value as a speculative proposition—such a man is a factor to be reckoned with. Marcus Leow is a pioneer. He was probably the first man on this continent to realize the immense possibili-ties of the moving picture show. Eight years ago he started the first moving picture theatres in the City of New York, and his initiative has been tollowed in every city and town on this continent. As in other cities where he has con-structed theatres, Mr. Leow enlisted the services of Thomas J. Lamb of New York, probably the most expert the-atrical architect in America, and the latter has achieved something hitherto unknown in Canada—the duplex theatre, that is to say, two playhouses in one.
