

BIG ATTENDANCE OF HIGHLANDERS

Exactly Six Hundred Drilled
Last Night to Band

ARRANGING ARTILLERY

War Establishment Will Prob-
ably Be Decided on—
Half From Toronto.

All the galleries at the armory were filled with spectators last night to see the 48th Highlanders drill, under command of Lieut. Col. Donald. There was a turnout of exactly 600 men, which number includes 60 recruits, also in the drill. The band, under the leadership of Lieut. Slater, was formed up in a large circle in the centre of the armory, and gave a continental concert while the drilling was going on. In several of the selections, the band members sang the choruses as well as playing them. The bagpipers also took a part in the music provided. The platoon drill was not taken up last night.

Lieut. George H. Cassels and Lieut. (Prov.) J. F. Lash, having applied for commissions, were taken on the strength of the regiment, pending official confirmation. Serg. D. C. W. Smith has been appointed to color-guard.

A class for the instruction of non-commissioned officers and men desiring to qualify will be formed on Monday at 8.15 p.m.

Clause No. 13 in the orders of the day was headed "mobilization and read as follows:

"Notwithstanding what has appeared in the public press respecting the mobilization of the regiment on Monday last, all ranks are required to hold themselves in readiness for a similar call at any hour."

The 48th Highlanders are in need of recruits to make up for the number who have enlisted, and attention is called to the new recruit class which is just starting.

Forty members of the 48th Highlanders will be sent on guard duty to Stanley Barracks tomorrow to replace those of the present guard who desire to return to their employment. The forty of the new guard will, if possible, be chosen from men out of employment.

Artillery Expected.

The arrival of several hundred men, which will bring the Mounted Rifles regiment nearly up to full strength, will be the feature event of the Exhibition Park camp today. Quotas from the Governor-General's Body Guard, the 9th Militia Battalion, Toronto; the 2nd Dragoons, St. Catharines; and the 25th, Brantford, are expected to arrive today. They will be quartered in the poultry building and number about 525.

The 9th Battery, Canadian Field Artillery, are expected to camp on site Tuesday or Wednesday. A great deal of interest is being manifested in the artillery. About a four-gun battery, composed of 142 men, including officers, is at present being arranged for, Toronto supplying half this number. There is more than a probability that a six-gun battery, needing 188 men, will eventually be decided upon. The six-gun battery is known as the new establishment. About 25 more men than are required at present have passed the medical inspection for the C. F. A.

The route marching by companies was carried on again yesterday, and most of the companies on the ground were carrying rifles while manoeuvring about on the lawn. Manoeuvring on a bigger scale is expected to start

Owing to the fact that there is no means of heating St. Andrew's Hall, the city has supplied a factory on Eastern Avenue, to which the association will move its machinery in the near future.

Loans to Dominions FOR WAR USES ONLY

Funds Cannot Be Devoted to Ordinary State Purposes.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—The treasury minute has been issued which makes clear the purposes for which advances are to be made to the Dominion Governments under a vote of credit out of any war loans to be raised by the government of Great Britain. The treasury minute sets out that the object of these advances is to provide funds to meet naval and military expenditures incurred by the dominions and other charges directly due to the crisis.

"ELLIOTT'S HORSE" TO LOSE ITS IDENTITY

But Eighty Members Will Go to
Front With Other Units.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—The eighty men who formed what was to be known as Elliott's Horse, who came to England from Western Canada, have at last found an asylum in the Canadian contingent at Salisbury Plain. The men were sent down yesterday. It is understood that arrangements have been made whereby they will be drafted into different units of the division. This of course, disperses them as a unit of their own, but none of them will experience much regret upon that point, their chief desire being to get to the front.

NEUTRALITY PRESERVED ECUADOR MAINTAINS

Reply Given to Protests Made by
Britain and France.

QUITO, Ecuador, Nov. 19, via Guayaquil, Nov. 20.—The American minister to Ecuador, C. S. Hartman, had a conference today with Foreign Minister Moreno concerning the protests of France and Great Britain in connection with the reported violation of her neutrality obligations by Ecuador.

Senor Moreno declared the government had observed the strictest neutrality. In the matter of the complaint that belligerent vessels had violated the neutrality of the Galapagos Islands, in the Pacific, the foreign minister said the government was obliged to have this occurrence investigated.

PRESENTS FREE OF DUTY.

OTTAWA, Nov. 20.—A cable has been received from the secretary of state for the colonies stating that presents to individual soldiers or to bodies of men belonging to the Canadian expeditionary force will be admitted free of duty.

BELGIANS' PLIGHT GROWING WORSE

Twenty-Five Thousand Re-
fugees Pouring Into Brus-
sels Daily.

LONDON, Nov. 20, 6.40 p.m.—Notwithstanding the amount of relief work which is being done for the Belgians, conditions there, in the larger cities, as well as the rural districts, are becoming more serious. Jean Van Branden, a member of the Belgian National Relief Committee, who arrived here today from Brussels to consult the American Relief Commission, said that the situation in Brussels was growing more alarming constantly, as refugees are pouring into that city at the rate of 25,000 a day.

"This influx," he said, "is due to a lack of fuel as well as of food. Brussels has plenty of coal, but the interruption of transportation makes it impossible to carry coal to remote villages. Refugees are flocking to Liege and other large towns as well as to Brussels."

The people are entirely dependent on kerosene for both heating and cooking.

COMMANDANT OF R. M. C. WOULD GO TO FRONT

RENTAL PAYMENT EXTENDED.

OTTAWA, Nov. 20.—On account of the financial stringency due to the war the government has extended for one year the time for payment of annual rental on petroleum and natural gas properties leased in Western Canada.

Homely Hair Hints.

The effect of a good boric acid solution upon the hair and scalp is really quite remarkable. It is a pity some enterprising firm has not taken it up and advertised such a preparation. As it is one must make up one's own mind. This is a very simple matter, however. From the drugist get one-fourth pint of bay rum and about an ounce of pure borax. Mix together and apply to the scalp and hair roots occasionally with the finger tips. The dandruff disappears like magic, and, as hair, there is a marked improvement at once. The scalp is left fresh, clean and invigorated, and the hair roots fairly tingle with new life.

About Shampooes.

To quote an eminent London physician: "The slimy egg cannot dissolve the scalp impurities, but only adds to the trouble by completely clogging the pores with animal matter. The substance sticks, decomposes, thereby causing the hair to assume a dead, dull color. I heartily recommend the use of a tea-spoonful of stale salt in a cup of hot water. Besides, the hair has the appearance of being more naturally wavy and curling, and the application is really beneficial. Most any druggist can supply the liquid in sufficient quantity. A small quantity should be put on before retiring, and for the purpose a clean tooth brush. The effect upon arising is delightful.
