It depends on the man more than anything clas, for, if the man is incompletent, every favorable condition goes for nothin, while one who has the tact or experience to manage well, instinctively, as it may be said, will succeed where such disadvantages exist as would wholly prevent success with ordinary men. Fairly good stock sheep may be lought at present for about \$2.5 a. a head, and at enth cost there is good profit in spite of the low price of wool. The most profit is made from a small, well-managed flock on a farm, as a part of the business, as the sheep will consume much that would otherwise be wasted, and there is no special expense in caring for the flock. In this case the leads will pay all the expense, and the wool will pay a good interest on the money invested, together with the sale of the old sheep for mutton when they are fatted. The little Spring pigs may be r\_shed ahead rapidly by a little attention in feeding. From the first they should be got acquainted with, so as to come to hand without-difficulty. Then a part of the yard is fenced off with spaces in the fence for the little pigs to come through to get the milk. Soon some meal or ground oats may be given with the milk, and then dry. The two liquids are strained and mixed together and then diluted by the addition of sixteen gallons more of water. This is sprayed on the troes when the fruit is as large as marbles. By adding a pound of paris green to this liquid, the various insects that infest app's trees will be destroyed. The scab, of course, is only killed or prevented where the spraying touch, as the fruit, so that the work is to be done thoroughly.
