population. What is to he done? The Lord made the earth for the people. Unpossessed and uncultivated soil is intolerable if men are starving for food. A good half of Australia will never he inhabited hy white men. The climate forhide it. The Philippines are sparsely populated. The Japanese know these facts and are creating a great navy—for the sea, under the sea and in the air. An excuse will eome time he found for taking possession of these islands. Britain is the protection of Australia and hesidee knowing these things these latter will huild an efficient navy. The United States does not want war with the Japanese and many Americans fully appreciate the fact that these Asiatic islands would be the hone of contention. If they get rid of them now, as they announce they will do, it may not only prove to he justice and generosity, hut even good policy.

Going hack to Europe, which is the crux of the problem, it is pertinent to ask what will be done with the little States and peoplee. They must he preserved. It is the only way. A people, he they never so small, profoundly conscious of nationhood—Israel for instance—will keep the fires of patriotism smoldering a thousand years, waiting an opportunity to let the fiames burst forth again. England's method, at any rate, short of supreme sovereignty, giving peoples autonomy, letting the Bothae and the Lauriers govern themselves is the

only way to keep them sisterly and loyal.

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The experience of Germany in Poland and Alsace-Lorraine, where with their method of thoroughness and hrutality they persistently endeavored to smother the smouldering emhers of nationality, ought to he enough to warn the ambaesadors who will eoon sit in conference, to draw a new map of Europe, against again trying that useless and tyrannical experiment. Belgium, if not Denmark and Holland, is the desideratum of the German heart. They have the Teutonic strain. If they would only hand over their covereignty what a sea coast would not Germany possess. Rotterdam is ae necessary for the Vaterland's amhitions as Constantinople is for the Russians or Avlona is to the Austrians. England will stuhhornly oppose an Antwerp or Rotterdam base-one Heligoland is enough. Thie is the reacon the war will drag on. There is no use parleying till many of the amhitione of the Teuton-Turk alliance are shandoned. England is committed to the conservation of the little countries. That was why she sent her expeditionary force to Belgium. Even if eelf-defense was her primary and fundamental motive, it was hest consulted hy defending Belgium and France as huffer nations, and now it is war to the death that all these fundamental factors may he secured.
