French had greatly increased their Settlements upon each Side of the River Chaudiere, which falls into that of St. Lawrence, a few Miles above the City of Quebec; and that they were proceeding to make Settlements at about 30 Miles Distance, upon a noted \* Carryingplace, that separates the Head of the Chaudiere from the Kennebeck; which last River affords the French a shorter Passage from Quebec for making Descents upon the Provinces of the Massachusets Bay, and New Hampshire, and destroying the King's Woods there (from whence the Royal Navy is in a great measure supplied with white Pines for Masts, Yards, and Bowsprits) than any other Route whatever; and from which the Indians, during the War between them and New England in 1723 and 1724, had made all their Incursions and Ravages upon the Eastern Parts of the Massachusets Bay; that the Norridgwalk Indians inhabiting within his Majesty's Territories had given the new French Settlers Liberty to hunt any where in that Country, as a Recompence for the Service, they were to be of to them in Time of War with the English, by supplying them with Provisions and military Stores; and that the Arresigunnticook, Norridgwalk, and Penobscot Indians were upon the Point of breaking out into Hostilities against Mar. 28. the English; wherefore in consequence of his Majesty's Orders be laid these several Matters
