

Two Long Shots Win in the Rain at Woodbine

The house of Hendrie may have triumphed over the Patterson forces in that memorable battle twenty years ago, when the momentous question to race or not to race in the rain was up for decision, but the postmaster's idea has prevailed ever since and the horses always run at Woodbine Park according to schedule regardless of the condition of the track.
