

TORONTO PARKS IMMORAL CENTRES

Report of Anglican Synod Committee Shows Deporable Conditions.

DANGEROUS MOTORISTS

Prevailing Habit of Inveigling Young Girls to Ruin.

Toronto's morality is to be discussed at the Anglican Synod at St. James' parish house today. Conditions are deplorable in some respects, according to the report of the special committee appointed last year to investigate. The report featured yesterday's proceedings when it was formally presented, as it makes a dual charge that the Toronto public parks are centres of immorality. The report said: "The great need of better lighting and policing of the parks of our city is evidenced by the statements obtained by your committee from the morally delinquent of the city, as well as the Big Sister Association, the League, the General and Base Hospitals, and the residents adjacent to the parks."

"There appears to be a particular need of some action regarding all of Toronto's parks, as well as the unlighted small wooded and unpolluted islands and sections of islands of our island parks and the Beaches and districts adjacent to street railway terminals."

Call on Board of Control

Notice of a resolution was given to call upon the board of control to have greater attention given to the prevention of immorality and specifically to "ameliorate the alarming conditions prevailing as a result of a large number of men driving automobiles, into which are invited young girls."

Rev. E. C. Cayley presented a resolution expressive of sympathy with all true sufferers from industrial conditions. In presenting the motion, he said: "There is in the hearts of the clergy and laity of the church far deeper sympathy for those who find life hard, and there is a far larger measure of Christian indignation against the social wrongs than is generally supposed by those who are not habitually present at public worship."

Peace Reception.

In accord with the return of peace, the reception by the bishop of Toronto and Mrs. Sweeney yesterday afternoon, at the see home, was attended by the members of the synod. An enthusiastic missionary meeting was held last night at which inspiring reviews of the Anglican Church activities in the home mission fields in the Orient were given by Rev. Dr. Seager, Rev. Dr. Cayley and Rev. Dr. Cotton.

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W.C.T.U. REPORTS WAR ACTIVITIES

Total of \$35,000, and Thousands of Sox Sent Overseas.

The principal report given at the annual meeting at Willard Hall yesterday was that which told of what had been done for soldiers' comforts during the war. The report read by Mrs. H. Clifton Dawson told of \$3,380 to provide chocolate drinks for the soldiers' year for motor ambulances, \$1,100 for two field kitchens, and a total of \$35,000 sent overseas. Value of boxes shipped equalled \$20,371 and 15,500 pairs of socks were knit. In commenting on her report the convenor pointed out that figures shown did not represent all the activities of the members, much of which had been done in association with others, particularly the Y. M. C. A., who reaped the credit of their work.

Mrs. H. E. Kennedy reported for Mrs. Kerr on the evangelistic activities, telling of a series of addresses on Bible study and of the observation of the half-hour devotion by a number of the unions. Mrs. P. C. Johnston spoke on conservation and production, a report of the Cynthia "Y" being read as a sample of the work done. This branch reported having under cultivation 11,000 feet of land, the products from which realized \$12,250.

Many Turned Away

The house report, read by Mrs. Hines, told of 60 girls in residence at Willard Hall and many turned away for want of space. "Systematic and Proportionate Giving" was the subject of a paper by Mrs. Forester, who stated that this was increasing among the unions.

Mrs. A. O. Rutherford drew attention of the meeting to the need for the secretary communicating with the committee on the referendum in relation to the students' vote.

ARISTOCRATIC ROSDALE AFRAID OF BACKRACKS

Aristocratic Rosedale is very upset at the prospect of the Stanley Park back and the R. C. R. being removed to the demolition of the old Rosedale. The mayor stated yesterday afternoon that he understood from Ottawa that such a removal was in contemplation. Rosedale is not enthusiastic in the matter and declares that property in that part of the city had depreciated to a big extent since the beginning of the war and asserts that a backrack full of soldiers would still further lower the values. Land selling before the war for \$110 a foot is now down to \$60 it was declared.

RULE DOES NOT APPLY TO CONSCRIPTED MEN

The heads of the street cleaning department are to be called into conference with the board of control over a complaint of two employees of the department are to be called into conference to make room for two conscripts. The discharged men state they have resided in Toronto for 40 years, have served the department for four years, and tried to enlist but were turned down. Controller Maguire contends that the council's rule in regard to returned men does not mean that employees should be laid off, but that room should be made for men from the department who have returned from overseas.

G. A. C. ASK BAND GRANT

Commissioner Bradshaw is to report to the board of control on a request from the Grand Army of Canada for a grant of \$4,500 to provide them with band instruments. Controller Maguire declared such a grant would establish a precedent and he was anxious to know how far it would involve the city.

The mayor was in favor of making a grant of \$500 by being doing so he thought the board should secure a report upon the subject.

SUNDAY ICE CREAM FOR CENTRE ISLAND

McBride Considers Lords Day Alliance "Verbotsen" Pro-vocative of Riot.

BYLAW A FARCE

Mayor Says Prohibition is Unfair and Unjust to People.

You will be able to eat your ice cream on Sundays at Centre Island, Kew Gardens, High Park, Riverdale and Ward's Island, despite the Lord's Day Observance Society—at least, so decided the board of control yesterday. James Haverson, K.C., attended before the board to inquire why his client, Mr. Bulmer, was not granted a restaurant license and allowed to sell ice cream on Sundays on the island. For a long time past Mr. Bulmer had held such a license for his refreshment booths at High Park, Centre Island and Kew Gardens, but it had lately been refused renewal.

Con. McBride: Why has this license been refused? Do you serve meals?

Mr. Bulmer: Yes. It appears that a policeman has the right to say whether or not the structure is permanent, and no license will be issued without his say-so.

Con. McBride: The people must have ice cream on the island. Is your building permanent? Do you live in it winter and summer?

Mr. Haverson: Yes. It's been there for ages.

Mr. Davenport was sent for and asked why the license had been refused.

Mr. Davenport: Before I can issue a license I must have a certificate from the police department certifying that the building complies with the bylaw. We can give no one permission to break the Lord's Day act.

Con. McBride: "If this Lord's Day Alliance thing keeps up there's going to be a riot. Enough privileges have been taken away from the public without taking their ice cream in weather like this. Why, I ate ice cream last night myself, and I could have eaten three or four bricks."

Chief of Police Grasset: "The police have no alternative but to enforce the bylaw unless it is repealed. A refreshment house is a place where light refreshments are served, such as ice cream, candy, soda, etc., and a victualling license permits the sale of meals."

Con. Maguire: "Then in order to get ice cream you've got to order a meal."

"I'd repeal the bylaw," observed the mayor, "it is unfair and unjust. Sale of ice cream on Sunday should be permitted."

The chief pointed out that there was no report against the license under discussion, and the board instructed that it be issued.

"The bylaw against selling ice

cream is a farce, and the people won't stand for it," the mayor said. "Two soldiers on Ossington Avenue were closed up last Sunday because they sold an ice cream cone."

SHORT OF TRAFFIC POLICE.

The harbor commission has complained to the mayor that there is a lack of a traffic police officer at the King and Queen streets intersection in the west end of the city. The matter was referred to the chief of police, who advised that a constable be placed at the corner when the volume of traffic warrants his presence, providing there is a man available. The chief states that the force is so very much understrength that the inspectors are obliged to do the best they can with the number of men at their disposal for street duty.
