European visible supply decreased 1,300,000 bushels for the week, against an increase of a like amount last week. The American visible supply increased 2,852,000, and is now about 200,000 larger than last year, while the crop was short. The world visible, according to Bradstreet's, increased 2,942,000, against 9,222,000 last year, and 7,457,000 last year, and is now 2,549,000 less than a year ago.

Primary receipts today were same volume as last year, and the cash demand was better, and the Dutch demand was the last two days have aggregated over a million and a quarter bushels, all but three cargoes being for export. The futures in our market were strong all day. Russian and Canadian news was bullish, and to the small increase in the world's visible is the most so far all I think we are seeing for a good advance in all grains, and that wheat will touch 90c or over. We may get reactions on selling by the big lots, but think they will prove fine spots to buy, wheat, corn and oats.

Corn—The proportion of new corn moving steadily increasing. Shipping demand is fairly satisfactory, but exporters are not doing much business. Reimburse local receipts to-morrow are very small, and the large local out-movement this and last week has created a sentiment in favor of higher prices. The leading short interest in May contracts is \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000, even at the advance, and the concentrated long holdings were further increased. The market has had such a liberal advance that purchases will only be in order on setbacks, but we look to see corn sell higher ultimately.

Oats—The enormous shipping and export demand in oats recently has created a demand for the futures from commission houses, which looks like scattered, public buying. This is rather against the market temporarily, also cars will no doubt sell higher ultimately.
