AN ALDERMAN UNSEATED.

The Master in Chambers Deposits Aids Made of Napanee and Orders a New Election.

The learned Chief Justice of the Divisional Court remarked to-day that some of the points raised by counsel were so small as not to be discernible with the naked eye, or words to that effect.

The point raised in Marples v. Rosebrough, however, does not need a magnifying glass to make it important to the parties, and yet it is simply whether a report made by James S. Cartwright, Esq., an officer referee, upon a reference under the Judicature Act, is valid or invalid, because he concluded the taking of evidence and made the report during the Christmas vacation.

W. J. Elliott for defendant, Shepley, Q.C., for plaintiff. The court reserved judgment.

In Abraham v. Hacking the Divisional Court dismissed the plaintiff's appeal from the judgment of Robertson, J., in favor of the defendant Annie Hacking. In a weak moment she allowed \$48 worth of notes for her husband. The only separate estate the plaintiff proved she had consisted of an engagement ring, watch and chain and clothing, and the court held, having regard to the amount of the plaintiff's claim, that the defendant cannot be said to have contracted with regard to her separate estate when she endorsed the notes.

In Reg. ex rel. Burns v. Madole, Neil McCrimmon for the relator moved for an order before the Master in Chambers unseating the respondent Madole as councillor of the town of Napanee. C. J. Holman, for Madole, consented. The Master made the order, with costs and directing a new election.

In Ratner v. Journal Printing Company the Master directs the plaintiff to give security for costs in his libel action within four weeks, otherwise action dismissed with costs.
