FATAL FIRE THE EAST END

Fifteen-Year Old Girl Burned to Death Last Evening.

Mother of the Victim Seriously Burned in Trying to Rescue Her Daughter—The Deadly Coal Oil Again—Girl's Dress Caught, While Lighting a Fire in the Stove.

A fire occurred last night on Queen-street east over the Don, by which a 15-year-old girl was fatally burned and her mother seriously injured.

The fire originated in number 630 Queen-street east, the last house west in a row of three, extending to 634. The houses are rough-cast fronts, with the rear of clapboards, and the reason the fire extended from No. 630 was that there was no cut-away between the roofs, which were of board, raftered V-shaped over all three.

The house where the fire originated was occupied by Mr. Charles Brannon, a moulder in the employ of the Ontario Foundry Company. In the same house were his wife and two daughters, besides the brother of Mrs. Brannon, by the name of Tweedie, who was in the house when the fire broke out.

At 7:20 Osborne Gilpin, who lives at 620 Queen-street east, heard a scream, and looking across the road through the open gate, he saw Mrs. Brannon throw up her hands and fall in the corridor. He rushed over and managed, with the assistance of his wife, to get Mrs. Brannon and her daughter, and carrying them to the hospital.

On getting the two out who were burned, Dr. Cleland, who lives on the corner of St. Nicholas and Queen-street east, gave all his attention to the poor young girl, who had sustained all over. Mrs. Brannon, who was in the house when the fire broke out, was burned on the right side of the face, and on her right side and down the neck.

Starting in No. 630, the fire rapidly spread to the two adjoining houses, which burned like tinder. No. 630 is only a charred wreck, and the other two, although burned somewhat, received more damage from smoke and water.

The father's grief. Mr. Charles Brannon, the father of the child fatally burned, was not in the house when the fire broke out. He was at home, and, being notified, rushed home, only to find his wife and daughter lying helplessly on the floor.
