ROUGH TIME ON LAKE HURON.

Three Barges Adrift at the Mercy of the Gale-Man Swept Over-

board and Drowned. Sarnia, Ont., Nov. 1d.—The steamer Curtis arrived at Port Huron yesterday during the great storm and reported losing her tow off Sand Beach by the parting of the tow line. The tow comprised the barges Fas-sett, Reed and Holland. The former an-chored and her crew were taken off by the lifeboats from Sand Beach. The last seen of the Reed and Holland they had holsted a small sail and were making for the St. a small sail and were making for the St. Ciair River. Late last night it was reported that a barge had anchored off the lightship, but it was impossible to tell whether it was one of the Curtis' tow or not. The schooner Holland was brought into port about 10 o'clock this morning by one of the river tugs which had been on the outlook for the vessels that were adrift. She was waterlogged and gave every apprarance of having had a rough time of it on the lake.

Early this morning Mr. Henderson of the G. T. R. at Point Edward, found the body of a man on the beach at Point Edward, having been washed ashore. The body was that of a sailor, aged about 28 years, and was lashed to a plank. When the schooner Holland was passing Point Edward, the men on the boat called to some men on the wharf to be on the lookout for a body, as a sailor had been lost overboard from the Holland in Thursday night's storm.

The Holland was taken to Port Huron, and this morning the captain of the vessel was notified that a body had been found. He came across the river about noon to-day, and went to Point Edward to view the remains. The drowned man was idertified as James Trene of Buffalo, the sailor who was lost off the schooner Holland.
