A Medical Defense Against an Attack by That Sect.

To the Editor of The Advertiser?

In a letter recently published in your columns, a Christian Scientist quotes an article which he would have cept as settling the Harold Frederic case. The article quoted is from a periodical devoted to booming this sect and edited by "Judge" Hanna, of Boston. We have been unable to learn what court Judge Hanna ever presided over.

The newspapers, as a legitimate item of news, published an account of Frederic's death, of the inquest, and the verdict. Some papers contained, also, editorial comment thereon, the Toronto Globe among the number. The facts of the case are: 1. Frederic died under Christian Science treatment. 2. An inquest was held. 3. Both sides had equal opportunity of presenting evidence. 4. After an impartial trial in an English court, an English jury, sworn to render a verdict in accordance with the evidence, declared Mrs. Mills responsible for the death of Harold Frederic, and brought in a verdict of "guilty of man-slaughter." Christian Scientists claim Mrs. Mills had not fair play. Will any Canadian or American believe that she received foul play at the hands of a British court? Is not such claim pure sophistry, a childish subterfuge?

How does Judge Hanna meet the facts of the case? Thus: "Yellow jour-

nals," "hot-headed, one-sided writers of inflammatory editorials," "unreasoning and nonsensical philippies," "flamboy-ant volleys," "insane cry," "phials of venom," "malicious attacks," "foolish misapprehension, the invariable accompaniment of ignorance and prejudice.' All this in a short article! Does this not prove that the "judge" himself is a hot-headed, one-sided writer of inflammatory editorials and nonsensical philippics, and that he is intoxicated with the exuberance of his own verbosity? From the evidence furnished by the judge's article, his own head is hot-also swelled. Scientists profess great love for "truth," but the truth in this case seems to have disagreed with the judge's stomach and produced gas. A prescription of Carbo L.g. might help him. These "flamboyant volleys" seem to have hit the mark, judging from the amount of squealing the "judge" and some of his sect have indulged in since. It will amuse newspaper readers to hear that the London (England) Times, the Outlook, the New York Tribune, the Sun, the Toronto Globe, and our own "Tizer," are "yellow journals." If the learned judge's statements are correct, all these are saffron-hued. Mr. Hanna seems to have jaundiced vision at present, for the only example

he furnishes of a paper not off color is the Utica Observer. When a paper publishes matter furnished by "Scientists" it is passed around among the believers and pronounced "white." His judgment he would have us believe is so infallible that it requires no suspension. His reference to anti-toxine and bread pills is of the nature of a tu quoque argument. He would fain make the doctors out as bad as the "Scientists." This is the defense of a sect that lays claim to divine healing! He speaks of the "myriads of people who have lost confidence in drug physicians." Scientist literature is full of such statements. They are addicted to the figure of speech known as hyperbole. Would Judge Hanna deign to give facts in support of his statement about "myriads," or does he deem is ipse dixit sufficient proof? We would like

to know how the judge proves these statements of his that follow: 1. Frederic "was turner over to the physicians and died in their hands. The cablegraphic press reports do not say so, but perhaps they are "yellow," too; or, perhaps, the judge has a private wire.

2. "The physicians had shown their inability to cope with the disease." The evidence at the inquest proves the direct contrary. Hanna, of course, could brush that all aside by calling it 'yellow" evidence.

3. "The mental healers were not permitted to carry the experiment to a conclusion." If the death of the patient were not conclusion enough for these experimenters, how much furthey would they like to carry it? Then Hanna says Mrs. Mills was just "a sincere Christian woman call-

ed in to pray for the dying man. If a sincere Christian woman of any other creed were called in to pray, Hanna knows well that Scientists would term it "error." "Scientists" are not called in to pray. They are summoned to case of preying on the dying man, therefore, rather than of praying for

I have already imposed on your space, Mr. Editor, or I would like to discuss some of the wonderful "cures" claimed by Scientists.
