SALE OF THOROUGHBREDS.
Lexington, Ky., Nov. 28.—The feature of the closing day of the Eastern Thoroughbred sale was the purchase of the great stallion Imp. Top Gallant, the sire of Argal andophon II., for \$20,000. Competition was most lively, but when Mr. Alexander jumped from \$15,000 to \$20,000 Mr. Stone declared himself out of it. The Experimental Union—Prominent Speakers Invited.

Guelph, Nov. 25.—Mr. H. Eagle, of Afterside, president of the Western Butter and Cheese Association, and Mr. George Hately, Brantford, secretary, were visiting the city on Wednesday, looking over the ground in reference to the annual convention, which will be held in Guelph on Jan. 17, 18 and 19 next. A number of American speakers are on the programme, besides local talent. Both ministers of agriculture will be present, and the college staff will assist.

There will be a very busy day at Guelph on Wednesday, Dec. 7 next. The annual Christmas fat stock show will then be in full swing. Among the prizes to be awarded at this exhibition is a magnificent silver cup presented by Mr. Thomas Holliday, the well-known breeder. The Experimental Union, in connection with the Ontario Agricultural College, is also to be in session, and the Ontario Beekeepers' Association are to hold their annual meeting.

Among the speakers invited to be present are the governor-general, the lieutenant-governor of Ontario, Hon. John Dryden, Hon. J. M. Gibson, Hon. Sidney Fisher, Dominion minister of agriculture, and several of the leading agriculturists of the United States.

Washington, Nov. 25.—There is reason to believe that the administration is willing to purchase from Spain not only the Philippines and Cuban Island, but all of the Carolines and the Pelieu group. CHRISTIAN SCIENCE

A Medical Defense Against an Attack by That Sect.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:
In a letter recently published in your columns, a Christian Scientist quotes an article which he would have us accept as settling the Harold Frederic case. The article quoted is from a periodical devoted to honoring that sect and edited by "Judge" Hanna, of Boston. We have been unable to learn what court Judge Hanna ever presided over.

The newspapers, as a legitimate item of news, published an account of Frederic's death, of the inquest, and the verdict. Some papers contained, also, editorial comment thereon, the Toronto Globe among the number. Frederic died under Christian Science treatment. 2. An inquest was held. 3. Both sides had equal opportunity of presenting evidence. 4. After an impartial trial in an English court, an English jury, sworn to render a verdict in accordance with the evidence, declared Mrs. Mills responsible for the death of Harold Frederic, and brought in a verdict of "guilty of manslaughter." Christian Science claims that Mrs. Mills had not fair play. Will any Canadian or American believe that she received foul play at the hands of a British court? Is not such claim pure sophistry, a childish subterfuge?

They are summoned to a case just as a medical practitioner is, and collect their fee. Mrs. Mills testified in court that she charged a guinea a week for treating patients. It was a case of praying on the dying man, therefore, rather than of praying for him.
