Five Hundred Loyalist Troops Dead After Fierce Fight With Mutinous Soldiers— Some Transfers Are Likely To Be Made in the Outlawed Duma Appeals to Army and Navy to Overthrow Government.

Stockholm, Sweden, July 31 .- It is reported that a mutiny broke out at midnight in the fortress of Sveaborg, Finland. The officers' families and the wounded are said to have been sent to Helsingfors.

A dispatch to a news agency from Helsingsfors, Finland, says that a porlion of the garrison of Sveaborg mutinied last night, and that a long and a sanguinary struggle took place between the mutineers and the loyal troops, in which the former are said to have been victorious. The mutineers, it is added, are now in possession of the fortress. Many were killed or wounded during the fighting.

Sveaborg is a strongly fortified town of Russian Finland, situated on five slands in the Gulf of Finland, immediate southeast of Helsingfors. The defends the harbor of Helsingfors, and consists of numerous military works and batteries, and a military arsenal.

FOUGHT ALL NIGHT.

Helsingfors, Finland, July 31.-A serious mutiny has broken out in the great fortress of Sveaborg, which defends the sea approaches to Helsingfors. Since 10 o'clock last night there has been a havy cannonade at the fortress interspersed with volleys of rifle shooting.
