Windsor, May 26.—Protesting against the new taxation scheme as proposed in the recent budget, the Border Cities Retail Merchants' Association executive, in special session here, sent telegrams to Ottawa. Many amendments to the act are suggested, the most important being that the tax be collected only on the excess selling price, i. e., the amount over and above the amount excess selling price, i. e., the amount over and above the amount exempted.
