# BE PAID BY 1924

Washington, Dec. 10.—Under an agreement with the British Government the debt of \$122,000,000 due this country for silver purchased during the war will be paid by 1924, according to details of the plan made public today by Secretary Houston. Payment will be made in equal annual installments in the years from 1921 to 1924 in the proportions of 60 per cent on April 15 and 40 per cent on May 15 of each year, with accrued interest at 5 per cent from April 15, 1919.




