Court of Much Interest.

First of the non-jury cases to be entered for the assize court, which opens at the court house on January 24, was that of Albert C. Joily vs. Joseph H. Sherry, a dispute over the ownership of a house.

Jolly, who is a contractor, stated that he commenced building a house in the city in 1910, but was unable to finish it on account of sickness. He owed the defendant \$200, and gave him a promissory note for the Later he borrowed \$800 on a more large on the house which was in the course of construction, to pay for material and wages. He claims that the defendant was to finish the building of the house, and that he, the plaintiff, was to convey his equity therein to him as collateral security of the promissory note, and that when the plaintiff recovered it was to be reconveyed, but in the meantime was to be held by the defendant in trust. Notwithstanding this agreement, he contends, the defendant received judgment on the promissory note in default of the plaintiff entering an appearance.

The defendant, he says, secured rents, issues and profits on the house, and refuses to re-convey it. Therefore, he asks that the defendant be declared a trustee for an accounting; the re-conveyance of the property in pursuance of the agreement, or in the alternation to have it declared that equity of the plaintiff in the property was transferred in satisfaction of the note, and judgment entered thereon set aside.


