## Goes to Italian **Owned Filly**

### NOTE AND COMMENT

Not for 26 years until yesterday has a filly won the Epsom Derby. In 1882 the Duke of Westminster's Shotover won, in 1857 the famous Blink Bonny tallied, and away back in 1801 Sir Charles Bunbury's Eleanor was successful. These three and Chevalier Ginistrelli's Signorinetta are the only allies that have ever won England's Giniistrelli's Signorinetta are the only fillies that have ever won England's now famous classic. For all her Italian ownership and Italian name, Signorinetta is thoroly English. She was bred at the Hamilton Stud Farm, Newmarekt, owned by the Chevalier Ginisbelli, her owner and breeder, and was got by Chalereux (son of Goodfellow, by Barcaidine, and L'Ete) out of Signorina, by St. Simon, out of Star of Porticl. Charlereux himself was a thoro good racehorse, among his victories being the Chesterfield Cup at Newmarket in 1898, while Signorina was the queen of 2-year-olds in 1899, winning no fewer than nine races off the reel, and in that year not being beaten.
