New Monarch Will Enter Games as a Sport and Not For Gambling Purposes.

English turfites are jubilant over the official announcement that King George will support a racing stable and be a pillar of the sport like his father. The following authorized announcement says: "King Edward having bequeathed his racing and breeding stud to the King," it is his majesty's intention to carry on these establishments on the same lines as in the past. In the racing stable there is a fine string of animals, two-year-olds, three-year-olds and four-year-olds. Among the last-named class are Minoru, winner of last year's Derby, and Princess de Galies, one of the foremost fillies of a year ago. There are about a dozen two-year-olds, all holding engagements up to 1912, but, according to the rules of racing, all their nominations became void on the death of the owner.

It is thought there will be a weeding out of the yearlings, of which there is a promising batch, and a new list of eagagements will be made out for the others. It is said that the King is not going into the sport in a gampling spirit, but, as a sport, and to perpetuate the memory of his father. Racing has been the favorite amusement of every English monarch since Charles II., who was himself a horseman of no mean ability.
