### SCHOOL BOARD HOLDS IMPORTANT MEETING

Local Option Suffers Temporary  
Rebuff—General News From  
All Parts of County.

TORONTO JUNCTION, Nov. 12.—A meeting of the executive of the Conservative Association is arranged for Friday evening, Nov. 15, at the office of the president, Dr. Hackett, 113 West Dundas-street.

In the police court to-day two 17-year-old boys, named John Usher and Fred Moses, were fined \$1 without costs for disorderly conduct. Mayor Baird presided.

The case against W. J. Brown of Weston-road, who is charged with having liquor on his premises, will be brought up on Friday. Police Magistrate Ellis is expected to return from Alberta this week and the case has been held over until his return.

#### Big Increase in Pupils.

The regular meeting of the school board was held to-night. The superintendent's report showed a large increase in attendance and again demonstrated the necessity for relieving the overcrowded state of every school in the Junction.

The present registration and attendance in the different schools are as follows:

Annette-street	657	587
Western ave.	602	415
Carlton	408	308
St. Clair-ave.	243	203

The foregoing figures show the total registration in town for October to be 1858, an increase of 86 over the month of September. "In four weeks," said Superintendent Wilson, "we have enough additional pupils for an extra teacher."

The crowded condition of St. Clair-avenue school, the supervisor thought, ought to receive special consideration from the board. "Why," the children are on half time thru want of room; we are one year behind the time in school accommodation. It is astonishing the number of children that are going up in that vicinity."

#### Objects to New Plan.

Principal McDonald of Annette-street school complained of the new innovation in the teaching staff, brought about by the board, whereby a teacher should specialize in some certain subjects and divide his or her time in different rooms. He believed that "a teacher should be competent to teach every subject on the public school curriculum," and he believed that far more satisfactory results would accrue if teachers were allowed to devote their entire time to one particular class.

Trustee Dr. Hackett favored the new idea and thought it should be given a longer trial.

Trustee Wright believed, that the board had favored teachers specializing. It would never succeed in public schools and recommended that the old order be restored. The matter was held over till the next meeting of the board.

Several of the teachers complained about the uncertainty of whether or not there was a semi-annual examination for junior fourth pupils in passing into the senior fourth. A resolution making the examination annual had, it seems, been passed by the board, but the teachers had not been notified.

Principal Colvin of the St. Clair-avenue school had heard it casually, and the teachers were undecided whether to prepare their pupils for an examination at the end of the fall term.

Trustee Goodieke Resigns.

The resignation of J. F. Goodieke was received. Dr. Hackett regretted his resignation, and in view of Mr. Goodieke's long and useful connection (13 years) with the board, moved that the resignation be held over till next meeting. The motion was carried.

Complaints were made about the delay in the installation of the heating apparatus for the lavatories in Annette-street school. That W. J. Dalton, the contractor, be allowed two days more to install the heater was the board's decision.
