## JUDGE LANDIS MUST CURB BAN JOHNSON

Because Old-Time Boss Has Become Arrogant on Account of Support of Deserter.

New York, Dec. 20.—Failure of the American League to elect New York, Boston and Chicago representatives to its board of directors at the annual meeting last Friday indicated clearly that President Ban Johnson and the club which supported him in the league war are in a bad way.

"During the past year Johnson has fought the appointment of Judge Landis as the national commissioner, and he has been successful in his efforts to prevent the election of a man who would be a real check on his power."

Johnson and his five clubs, he added, "are banded together by ties other than sportsmanship. The strength of this unholy alliance has made Johnson exceedingly arrogant and has been the cause of all the recent trouble in the American League and in baseball, and until it is broken there can be no peace. The elimination of Johnson would automatically restore tranquility."
