DATE BACK TO MAY 1

WOULD YIELD BODY IF NO REPRISALS

Irish Volunteers Negotiated for Production of Len- dram's Remains.

London, Oct. 4.—Additional details reaching the Irish office concerning the killing of Capt. Lendrum, resident magistrate of Kilsrush, County Clare, and the subsequent finding of the body on the railway line show, officials said today, that the Irish volunteers negotiated with the Royal Irish Constabulary to produce Lendrum, or his body, if no government agents would withhold the carrying out of reprisals which had been threatened.

HUNGER STRIKING IS NOW UNPOPULAR

MacSwiney's Long Fast Has Tended to Deter Other Irish Prisoners.

London, Oct. 5.—As a result of Lord Mayor MacSwiney's long fast, Irish prisoners have ceased to resort to hunger striking, says The Daily Mail today. The newspaper adds that there were more than 300 arrests in connection with Sinn Fein propaganda disturbances during September, but that only four of the men arrested attempted hunger striking, and these abandoned it in a day or two.

Dublin Accepts Bank's Offer.

Dublin, Oct. 4.—The Dublin corporation today decided to accept an offer of the Munster and Leinster Bank to purchase redeemable stock to the value of \$1,000,000. Ald. Cosgrove, Sinn Fein chairman of the finance committee, explained that there were decrees against the corporation to the extent of \$175,000 for criminal injuries, and potential decrees to the amount of \$500,000. Mr. MacWalter said they were accepting the offer under ordinary local government board rules, and were thus following the practice of that body, which they pledged themselves not to recognize.

FARMERS SAY TARIFF AIDS INDUSTRY ONLY

GOVERNMENT MAY ESTABLISH PAPER MILL

H. W. Woods, Speaking for Alberta Agriculturists, Be- fore Tariff Inquiry, De- clares Protection of Manu- facturers Has Forced Farm- ing in Canada Into Secondary Place.

Calgary, Alta., Oct. 4.—(Special).—The Alberta Farmers placed their case before the tariff commission today. It was more of a protest against crop failures than tariff extortion. From the manufacturers' standpoint, the tariff was unredemptive, but there is another side to the tariff and denunciation of such protection. It was a peculiar spectacle to witness H. W. Woods, president of the United Farmers of Alberta, admitting that he could not show the duty had increased the cost of parasitical industries and admitted that he could not name one. He claimed that combinations existed in the United States and Canada that raised the price of implements to the farmer. Asked if free trade would remove such combinations, he could not give a decision. When asked if a mowder at \$84, the present selling price, was too high, he said it was. When asked what was the cost of producing such a mowder he admitted he did not know.

Houses Burned in Roscom- mon in Revenge for At- tack on Barracks.

Dublin, Oct. 4.—Following upon an unsuccessful Sinn Fein raid for the purpose of burning the police barracks at French Park, County Roscommon, Saturday, reprisals were carried out in that neighborhood Sunday morning by police and military in major lorries.

CITIZENS CROWD TO PAY TAX BILLS

Over Five Thousand at Wickets Yesterday Make Record Payments.

The corridor of the city hall was crowded all day yesterday by citizens trying to get to the wickets to pay their taxes. Yesterday was the last day for receiving 1920 taxes before the five per cent. penalty became effective. Officials of the tax department said it was the biggest day they had ever experienced. More than five thousand people paid up yesterday, and the large staff were on the job until late at night counting money and checking up the receipts, which were finally found to total \$810,213.

BLACK OUTLOOK FOR IRELAND DURING THE COMING WINTER

Sanatoriums and Asylums Closing—Industries Paralyzed and Country is Facing Ruin.

London, Oct. 4.—A despatch to The Daily Mail from Dublin pictures a black outlook for Ireland during the coming winter. It says that owing to the shortage of money, sanatoriums and asylums are being closed; the burning of creameries has paralyzed that industry and the closing of 600 miles of railroad has cut off some areas from distributing centres.

SHORTAGE OF SCHOOL ACCOMMODATION IS BLAMED ON COUNCIL

Speakers Discuss Petitioning Legislature for Power to Raise Funds.

TO ASK CITY FIRST

All those who attended the special public meeting held at the administration offices of the board of education last night were agreed that the lack of school accommodation in Toronto was a matter of grave concern, but the problem of properly financing the needs of the board was a snag which caused differences of opinion and jocular repartee, although the meeting itself was among the most serious and important of the many held by this board. In a nutshell the position was that the chairman of the meeting, Mrs. Edith Groves, Dr. Noble, chairman of the board of education, and others, contended that the present deplorable situation arose from the fact that the city council when asked for necessary funds had given its veto, thus preventing any attempt on the part of the board to relieve the situation, which on the other hand Trustee Joe Bell contended that at least \$1,200,000 was now lying idle in the treasury, money which could be profitably used to relieve the congestion, and which was not used because of bad management on the part of the board.
