SEEKS FAIR TRIAL

New Inquiry Will Provide for Formal Presentation of P. A. T. A. Case

Canadian Press ZENORA, Ont., Nov. 9.—A commissioner will be appointed by the government for the completion of the inquiry into the alleged combine in the drug trade. Appointment of a commissioner under the Combines Investigation Act is being made by Hon. Peter Heenan, Minister of Labor, in order to provide the Proprietary Article Trade Association with the fullest opportunity for the formal presentation of their case, as requested by the association.

In a statement issued last night,

Hon. Peter Heenan states: "The statement I have received from the Proprietary Articles Trade Association, the alleged combine in the drug trade, is substantially an assertion of their claim that, prior to the issuance of the registrar's interim report, they did not have the full opportunity which is contemplated by the Combines Investigation Act to present their side of the case. Accordingly, they appeal for further insioners to be appointed under the

Combines Investigation Act. SATISFIED WITH REPORT

"I am satisfied that the report of the registrar was made only after full consideration of both sides of the case. The druggists' organization expresses doubt on this point. I hesitate to incur further delay, but rather than take in any way unfair to the trade, I would give them the benefit of the would give them the benefit of the doubt. Accordingly, in order to provide the P. A. T. A. with the fullest opportunity for the formal presentation of their case, I have decided to arrange for the appointment of a commissioner for this purpose and for the completion of the inquiry."
