From the Motion Picture Clarather was released to the cinema world not so long ago, one of Fannie Hurst's simple, homely tales of the Ghetto, "Humoresque." A story rich in humor, rich in pathos. A picture so real, so true and beautiful that it has been voted without acclaim one of the artistic successes of the year. It treats of a theme that knows not creed, race, color or language; the story of unselfish love. Into the picture, like some rare golden strain, the director has interpolated the world-old adage—"God could not be everywhere so he made mothers." One of the finest bits of emotional acting ever seen on stage or screen is Vera Gordon's portrayal of the Jewish mother who yearns for a son with a soul for music and, her desire granted, by her self-effacing love helps the lad to battle his way through opposition and adversity until he comes out on the mountain top.

When Miss Hurst was asked if she could suggest anyone for the mother part in "Humoresque" she said: "I know one person who could do it—and do it adequately—Vera Gordon—but she is in England." Miss Gordon was appearing in "Business Before Pleasure" in London—but she came back—and brought to the screen in this portrait of the spirit of the Ghetto a personality that dominates the picture and makes it unforgetable. And Vera Gordon's personality dominates off the screen. Even in a telephone conversation one can feel it. "But how will I know you?" she questioned in a big laughing voice, when I asked her to meet me for an interview. "And how will you know me? Now, wait—I will wear," she considered, helpfully, "a long cape with fringe, a black hat with a paradise feather, and I shall know you because you will be looking for some one."

A strong, well-poised, confident young woman—in her dark eyes the reflection of the romance and adventure, the sacrifice and endeavor that has made up her life.

Vera Gordon comes from troubled Russia. She has the pessimism of her race—the feeling was born in her centuries ago of being always—as she expressed it—"under an uplifted knife." Yet she is sure of her art, sure of her power, absolutely sure of herself in all ways but one. "I cannot," she says, "go to managers and tell them about myself and ask for "jobs." I think they should come to me," she said—and laughed. "I have always to laugh at myself? I am so contrary. The small things I will not do. So, if big things do not come—I sit down and wait. But the waiting is hard—because "I love to work. When I work, I am happy and alive. When I am idle, I am dead. Dead, but not buried." And she laughed again. "Life would have been very hard had I not learned here in America to see the funny side—and to laugh.

"I went on the stage at thirteen in Russia," she told me. "I was large for my age and my first part was a mother part. At seventeen I left Russia. My sweet-

Finally he escaped, and sent for me to join him. I was very young, but girls are older at seventeen in Russia than here—much older. We were married and came to Canada-Later, my father, mother and one brother stayed in Russia. We have not heard for four years, and fear the worst.

"In Canada I went on the stage—but my baby was born and to care for him I gave up the stage and traveling about, and for two years did concert work. Then we came to New York. Joseph Adler at once gave me work. I knew only Russian, but I learned Yiddish and played for five years in the East Side theatres. I learned and played two hundred parts—big things like 'Madame Xy' 'The Riddle Woman,' 'War Brides,' 'The Doll's House'—always hening that some day I could play them in English. Finally, I had my chance in English speaking plays. A good part in 'Why Worry' with Fannie Brice. A part in the only play Fannie Hurst ever wrote—'The Land of the Free'—a big part as the mother in 'The Gentile Wife' with Emily Stevens. I went to London to do 'Business Before Placesure' 'Yen came back to do 'Humoresque.'

"I have done one picture since 'Humoresque'—'The North Wind's Malice,' by Rupert Hughes. And now, I am taking a fling in vaudeville. I don't want to give up the speaking stage entirely. I think the voice is the natural form of expression—but pictures, too, can express much. But whether for stage or screen I want to be an artist in human characterization. I don't like the word 'actress.' To do natural things in the way a natural woman does them. That is not acting, is it? No. That is art."

Vera Gordon is an artist—but first she is a woman as wholesome as she is sincere—as lovable as she is human. Like Dvorak's masterpiece, she embodies the tears and the daughter of life. She is the soul of "Humoresque."
