RAIN MINED; THREE KILLED

Soldiers from Belfast for Dublin Victims—Two Previous Trains Passed Safely—De Valera was Under Arrest, but Released.

Belfast, June 24—A troop train consisting of soldiers from Belfast to Dublin was wrecked today at Abercrombie, near the explosion of a Sinn Fein mine. Two soldiers and one of the guards were killed by many others injured.

Dublin, June 24—Eamon DeValera, Irish republican leader, was arrested Wednesday night near this city and later released. It was definitely established today that he had been early denials from the Sinn Fein authorities that he had been apprehended.

Dublin, June 24—A military lorry was wrecked this afternoon at the junction of North Frederick and Dorset streets, with the loss of three lives and several others injured.

CUT SALARY OF ADDISON

CHINA'S APPEAL TO BRITISH LABOR

London, June 24—The president of the Chinese Workers' Union, Hsu Shih Chang, has appealed to the workers of Great Britain for friendly assistance in preventing renewal of the Anglo-Japanese treaty, according to the Herald (Labor organ), which prints an interview with B. L. Simpson, adviser to the Chinese government.

U. S. TARIFF.

Washington, June 24—(Canadian Press)—The reciprocity provisions of the new tariff measure it will be reported from the house ways and means committee, will give the president large powers to impose higher rates against any country discriminating against the United States in the matter of duties. It is expected to be the policy of the Harding administration to use these powers vigorously against all nations having discriminatory tariffs.

UNDERWRITERS GREW CAUTIOUS

Ban on Shipping of Certain Nations.

London, June 24—The tremendous losses of cargoes and ships at sea, which created a boom in London marine underwriting circles some months ago, resulted in the insurance agents putting the shipowners and exporters of one European nation under the ban. But refusal to do business with these persons failed to end the remarkable sequence of sinkings, most of which, strangely enough, occurred within reach of land, and were consequently for the most part without casualties.

Montreal, June 24—The first step was taken yesterday towards the building of a \$9,000,000 hotel which will occupy the site of the old high school in Peel street when the property was formally taken over from the Protestant Board of School Commissioners. The Mount Royal Hotel Co., was represented in the transaction by the first vice-president, Hon. W. J. Shaughnessy and the second vice-president, W. J. Cluff of Toronto.

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BEER IN SOLDIER CLUBS IN B. C.

Vancouver, B. C., June 24—All ex-service men's clubs in the province, whether or not in possession of Dominion charters, will at once reopen, if not already doing business, for the sale of beer to sons file members. The announcement was made here at a meeting of the mainland united soldiers' council, representing practically every soldier's organization in British Columbia.
