cannot help knowing that protection of certain industries has done much for those industries in this country, and proceeded to make specific reference to the iron and steel works of his own province, Nova Scotia. There has been no quarrel with Mr. McKenzie for his frankness; it is better that his attitude should be known beyond dispute, but his words must have greatly shaken the confidence of western Liberal members who are likely to leave the Union government on the tariff issue if the budget does not show material reductions in duties such as the agriculturists of the west have been demanding. Low-tariff Liberals on his own side of the house who have accepted his leadership for the session have also suffered a shock by Mr. McKenzie's pronouncement.

A general convention of the Liberal party and of others who may support it has been formally called. Bearing that in mind, the Liberal party ought not to be bound by the unhappy phrasing, to use the kindest term, of Mr. McKenzie's protectionist views. The tariff policy is one of the outstanding issues that call for decision by the conference, and it cannot be settled from the merely sectional point of view expressed by the present leader of the opposition. Mr. McKenzie is known to be in favor of tariff reduction in many things, but has always been a vigorous supporter of assistance to the iron and steel industries of his province. These are basic industries, and changes in the tariff of Canada cannot be made without consideration of the whole country and calls for thought and action commensurate with that fact. Any man who aspires to be the leader of one of the great national parties in Canada should be able to think nationally.

THE TARIFFS A NATIONAL ISSUE
