TRAINS COLLIDE AND FOUR OF PICNIC PARTY ARE KILLED

JUDGE FORBES GIVES FOUR OF THE BOYS THEIR FREEDOM

Two in City Cases; Two in Fairville—Ex-Covinct is Given Six Years and Harrigan's Alley Row Brings Two Year Sentence

Angus Gould, Robert Harrington, Frederick McDonough and Herbert Goodspeed, all charged with stealing and breaking and entering were allowed on suspended sentence by Judge Forbes, who said that the evidence was quite to the contrary, being that the prisoner struck McAndrews with an axe when he was down. He was sentenced to two years.

Fred McDonough pleaded guilty to the charges of breaking and entering and stealing and Herbert Goodspeed to four: L. P. D. Tilley, K. C. appeared for these prisoners and addressed the court in their behalf. W. C. Jordan of the Globe also said that Goodspeed had been a satisfactory employee of the Globe office, and they were willing to take him back. His Honor said that many representations had been made to him about these boys and their families, and he would allow them out on suspended sentence. He warned them that they would get two years for each charge if they were ever arrested again. Powers pleaded not guilty to assault and attempted to rob Frederick H. McKell and Michael Harrington in the Old Burying Ground on July 13th. The complainants, Policemen O'Neil and John M. Jenkins gave evidence and His Honor adjudged the prisoner guilty and sentenced him to three years on each charge. "Your Honor, do you think I would select a man who had money and choose bright daylight in front of the police station?" said the prisoner. "No, I would select a man who had money and a convenient spot, keep sober and have my tax about me." Percy Paul pleaded not guilty to robbery and decided that he would be tried with a jury.

FREDERICTON WINS

Decision of Railway Commission on C. P. R. Rates

(Special to Times) Fredericton, N. B., July 23.—The Dominion Railway steamer has decided that discrimination against Fredericton in the matter of passenger rates on the C. P. R. must cease. At present the rate on tickets sold in this city for American and western points is the same as the rate from St. John plus seventy cents. The board of trade has for some time been agitating for removal of this discrimination and recently presented a case to the Railway Commission. The commission has decided in favor of Fredericton's contention. The people here are naturally much pleased.
