TEN SEAMEN ARE RESCUED AFTER A HARD EXPERIENCE

Nearly Three Days on Top of Cabin of Waterlogged Schooner

Newport News, Va., June 12.—The British steamer Berwindale, Captain Williams, arrived yesterday with the captain and nine men of the crew of the foundered schooner Fannie Prescott, of Stonington, Conn. The men were rescued from the top of the cabin of the waterlogged schooner on Monday morning after having been without food or water for nearly three days. When sighted on Sunday afternoon, the schooner was seventy-five miles east of Savannah, drifting northeast. It was impossible to launch boats on account of a storm, and the steamer lay by until Monday morning. The Prescott was bound from Savannah to New York with lumber.

MORE THAT 1,500 VESSELS NOW HAVE WIRELESS EQUIPMENT

Important Principle Has Been Adopted by Britain and Dominions, Also Italy and Japan

London, June 13.—An official statement regarding the work of the international wireless conference says that at the only sitting of the full conference yet held, it was announced that the United Kingdom and the British Dominions, and also Italy and Japan had accepted the principle that ships must accept messages from other ships, whether or not they use the same system of wireless telegraphy. This principle has not hitherto been accepted by these countries except for messages relating to cases of distress. Its general application is now approved by practically all countries. It has been announced that the British government intends, as a result of the Titanic disaster, to ask the conference to consider what improvements can be made, with a view to obtaining the best possible use of the wireless telegraph for saving life at sea and insuring security in navigation. It is expected that this matter, which is perhaps the most important which the conference will consider, will be discussed at the next full meeting. The total number of ships of all sorts equipped with wireless telegraph is said to be 1,577. The total number of coast stations is 258.
