IN WILD RUNAWAY

**Bride and Groom in Peril as
Horses Dash Madly Block After
Block—Thrilling Rescue**

New York, March 16.—A coach, drawn
by a maddened team of horses, and carry-
ing a newly-married couple, swept through
the streets of East New York on Tuesday
afternoon, narrowly missed crashing into
a dozen other carriages, defied the best
efforts of two policemen to stop it, and
was finally steered into a telegraph pole
a mile from where it started, by Patrol-
man Harvey J. Kiefer. In bringing the
screws to a stop, Kiefer, who is an athlete
and baseball player, thrilled the crowds
which lined the streets by his exhibition
of bravery.

Miss Eva Hilford and Lewis Birken
were married at Roosevelt hall in the
presence of about 300 guests. After the
wedding they stepped into the bridal
coach, driven by Joseph Roman, and
started down Blake avenue. The coach
had gone only two blocks when the horses
were frightened by a passing automobile
and ran away. Roman struggled hard to
regain control of them, but they had taken
the bits in their teeth and would not heed
the pull on the reins.

Roman was thrown from his seat at the
next block, and the horses, now free from
any restraint, seemed to increase their
mad speed. The coach began to sway
from side to side, and several times just
grazed the sides of other carriages. Fear-
ing that he and his bride would be seri-
ously injured, if not killed, Birken opened
one of the side doors and tried to climb
to the driver's seat.

Mrs. Birken screamed and caught hold
of her husband's coat-tails, preventing
him from carrying out his purpose. When
Birken, calling for help, the team pro-
ceeded for three-quarters of a mile down
Blake avenue. At the junction of She-
field and Blake avenues Patrolman Arman
saw the runaway, and leaped for the
bride of the nearest horse. He missed
the reins and was thrown to the ground.
In the meantime another coach in the
wedding party set out after the bridal
carriage, and several times succeeded in
catching up with it. The bridal carriage
was making such zig-zag course, how-
ever, that those in the pursuing coach
did not dare to approach too close.

Three blocks farther down mounted
Patrolman McKee made a daring attempt
to stop the horses. He succeeded in get-
ting a hold on one of the reins, but the
horses shook him off and kept on their
wild way.

To the crowd who watched the mad
chase it seemed as though the persons in
the coach must be killed. Just when hope
of their safety was being given up, how-
ever, Policeman Kiefer appeared. He
pounced on the curb and made a grab for
the bride, only to flounder to the street,
but he quickly regained his feet and sprang
to the back of the coach. In order to
get a firm grip he smashed the small win-
dow in the back of the coach with his
hand, and then managed to gain a foothold
on one of the springs that protruded be-
hind the carriage.

Then he crawled along the top of the
coach, appearing as likely to fall off at
every turn until he gained the front
seat. The reins were now dragging at
the horses' heads, however, and the patrol-
man saw that he could do nothing from
where he sat. Leaping far out over the
dashboard, he jumped to the wagon pole
between the horses and landed astride of
it. He then worked his way slowly

ward until he reached the bride of the
bride.

After trying in vain to bring them to
a halt, Kiefer steered the team into a tele-
graph pole alongside the street, and they
were then soon subdued. Mr. and Mrs.
Birken were helped out of the coach by
the patrolman, and after turning them
over to their friends, who had caught up
with this time, Kiefer limped off to report
at his station house.

Birken and his wife, and many who
witnessed the patrolman's courage in
stopping the horses, said last night that
they were going to seek a reward for
Kiefer in the police department or at the
hands of Mayor Gaynor.
