**CABINET A WAITS ACTION ON SPEECH**

**Will Not Fill Vacant Posts Until After Throno Speech Delivered**

OTTAWA, Jan. 7.—Once the Speech from the Throne is delivered the Government proposes to assume its normal powers until it should be challenged immediately by the Opposition. If the Government should be so challenged, its future will depend on whether or not it can obtain a majority in the House of Commons.

Premier Macdonald King said tonight that he did not regard the election of the Speaker as a vote of confidence in the Government. The choice of a Speaker was a function of parliament and the selection did not necessarily imply that the Government had the approval of the Commons.

On the other hand, he made it clear that the Government proposes to resume its full powers after the Throno Speech is delivered. The delivery of the speech implied such a resumption of power, he said. It was the right of the Opposition to question the position of the government should it so desire, but failing this the Government functioned in a normal manner.

Since the election, the Government has refrained from entering the power of appointment and consequently a number of vacancies are unfilled. The above statement indicates, however, that until challenged, the Government will go ahead and make such appointments as it considers necessary.
