often be obtained for the women, but, in some cases, they were not employed a second time, owing to the indifferent manner in which the work was performed.

Several medical men have most kindly and generously given their time and medicine free, for which we wish to tender them our hearty

thanks.

Though the work has been heavier, and the responsibility greater this season, and often the ladies are weary in their labor of love, their hearts are refreshed and their energies quickened, by the assurance given, that "Inasmuch as ye did it to one of the least of these, my brethren, ye did it unto me," and the cup of cold water given in the name of Christ will have its great reward.
