The Colborne Street Obstructions Will be Removed as Soon as Possible.

Supt. Wm. Woollett, Owen McKay, engineer, and L. E. Tilson, travelling agent, of the L. E. & D. R. R., met the special committee of the city council, comprising Chairman E. W. Seane, Ald. Martin, Ald. Cowan, and City Engineer Shackleton, this morning.

The matter of the obstructions on Colborne St. was talked over. There seemed to have on the part of the city a misapprehension of the agreement entered into originally between the E. & H. and the city. Supt. Woollett said the railroad had right to run on Colborne street and the right to load and unload cars on the street. With this the city representatives disagreed, and claimed that the railroad merely had the right to run cars on one track along Colborne street.

In answer to a query as to whether he had seen the agreement, Mr. Woollett said he had been unable to do so although he had tried to find it. He also said that on finding the agreement if his ideas were not correct he would at once see that the agreement was adhered to by the railroad. The L. E. & D. R. R. desired to be on friendly terms with the city, and the railroad was willing to keep to the terms of the agreement. The city would have no cause for complaint as to the unloading of the cars as soon as it was possible to clear up the title of the land on the north side of the creek, which the railroad was trying to purchase in an amicable way. As soon as the deal is closed the street will be put in proper condition and there will then be no encroachment. There will also then be no cause for complaint in the matter of unloading cars on Head St.

Mr. Woollett was very reasonable and appeared to be willing to do everything possible to satisfy the city representatives.
