Put on therefore, as the elect of God, holy and beloved, bowels of mercies, kindness, meekness, long-suffering, forbearing one another, and forgiving one another; if any man have a complaint against any, even as Christ forgave us, so also do ye. And, above all these things, put on charity, which is the bond of perfectness: and the God of peace, that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that Great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting Covenant, make you perfect in every good work to do his will, working in you that which is well-pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ; to whom be glory for ever and ever.
