

Pasteur and others, showing that some of the most fatal virulent diseases may be rendered comparatively harmless by inoculation with a weakened virus, have led to the suggestion of the post sibility of combatting tuberculosis in the same manner. It is now quite generally believed that this disease, like small pox, chicken cholera and anthrax, is due to the very rapid increase of certain minute organisms in the body, and it seems reasonable to hope that inoculation with its weakened germs may produce as favorable results as have been achieved in the case of the other maladies.
