Steamer and Crew Lost. HALIFAX, N. S., May 20.—News of the loss of the steamer Turbot Bay this morning on St. Paul's Island, coming immediately upon the stranding of the Allan liner Hibernia, on the Newfoundland coast, caused some excitement in shipping circles in this port. The Turbot Bay left Sydney at 6 o'clock last evening with a full cargo of 3,333 tons of coal, for the Dominion Coal Company at Montreal. It was then thick with fog along the coast. It was literally impossible to see the lights of the coast. The captain, as soon as he cleared the harbor, signalled full speed. All went well until between 3 and 4 o'clock in the morning, when without a warning the vessel struck the rocks. For a moment she heaved on the rocks and then quickly backed off into deep water, and twenty minutes afterwards sank. The Turbot Bay carried a crew of twenty-two men, besides Captain Hayden, and only one man escaped. It is believed that these saved the two down the barge after the steamer struck, and stood on the rock when the steamer backed off and went down. This was the Turbot Bay's first trip for the season up the Gulf, having arrived from Shields, England, only a few days ago with brick and cement for the steel company. It was also Captain Hayden's first trip on board the ship, having been previously in command of sailing vessels, the last being the ship Queen Victoria of Glasgow. He is married to a Halifax lady, who with three children is at present in the home part of Ireland. It is believed by shipping men here that Captain Hayden's experience in the Gulf had something to do with the accident. It is known that compass was very considerably when in the Gulf, and Captain Hayden may not have been familiar with this. The cause of the variation is not known. All the crew belonged either to England or Sweden.
