NORDICA'S TRIUMPH.

World's Greatest Soprano Charmed a Record Audience in St. John Last Night

When it is stated that men who last night did not three good dollars a seat for the privilege of hearing Nordica, have today no thought of regret, there would seem to be little need for further comment.

The concert artistically and financially made a record for this city. Never had so many people pay such prices at any entertainment in the Opera House and never did an audience get better worth of its money.

Madame Nordica with her beautiful presence, glorious voice and splendid dramatic ability, and a new musical standard for St. John.

Every seat in the building was occupied and hundreds occupied seats on the stage and filled all the available standing room.

The crowd besieged the doors before six o'clock.

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N. B. LEGISLATURE.

Budget Speech Delivered by Atty-General Pugsley—The Same Old Promise of a Surplus.

FREDERICTON, April 12.—In the house today, Mr. Clark asked several questions re the N.B. Southern Railway and the failure of the road to keep up their service last winter.

The attorney general stated that the attention of the government had been called to the interruption of traffic on the New Brunswick Southern. While realizing that the past winter had been a particularly severe one, he had asked the management of the road for an explanation and had received a lengthy letter from Frank J. McPhee, superintendent of the road. He outlined fully the efforts of the management to keep the line open.

The attorney general said the local government could do nothing, but the Dominion government could operate the road as a branch line. He favored the operation of all branch lines by the government.

Mr. Hazen agreed in this, but pointed out that in 1902 the speech from the throne announced that the members would be invited to consider the Dominion authorities might not properly be urged to make arrangements for branch lines. This the government seemed to have lost sight of.

Mr. Pugsley said he had a strong hope that the government would have taken the case into consideration.

Mr. Pugsley denied the rumor that he had been retained by the Bank of New Brunswick to promote the lease of the road to the Dominion.

The house in committee took up the Bill. Assessment Bill. After a lengthy debate the house divided equally on Mr. Copp's motion to give the bill the three months' notice, as follows:

Yeas—Messrs. Copp, Burden, Campbell, Goggin, Barnes, Burns, Gimmer, Hazen, Hartt, Morrissey, Glesler, Logie, Porter, Clarke, Morrison and LeGere—16.

Nays—Hon. Messrs. Pugsley, Lablache, Sweeney, Hill, Maclean, Macdonald, King, Ryan, Ruddock, Tweeddale, Purdy, Robertson, Smith, Young, Lantieri, Burgess and Clouston—16.

Mr. Pugsley and Mr. Macdonald were paired off, Hon. Mr. Harris with Mr. Allen and Mr. Osmen with Mr. White.

The motion was carried by the casting vote of the chairman.

Mr. Pugsley made several objections which are under consideration by the chairman.
