CLOSING COTTON LETTER.

New York, Oct. 28. - Last night wit-
nessed a fulfillment of the predictions
of low depression and a killing frost
throughout the belt but not a slightly
higher opening it became apparent
that there was a widespread dispo-
sition to take profits on this news. A
series of realizations caused prices to
fall 25 points lower. Good support de-
veloped on the decline however and
the into-sight figures for the week
which were about 8,000 below last
year's, combined with a general con-
viction that the selling had been over-
done, caused a heavy movement
which virtually restored last night's
closing level. While it is admitted
that the frosts so far have done but
little damage, it is nevertheless
argued that this was due to the fact
that there is no top crop to be
killed. Low crop ideas are still pre-
valent and in bullish circles the feeling
persists that the upward movement
will be resumed in the near future,
even when the big bull speculators
believe the time is ripe. We still
think it risky to sell cotton except on
very sharp bulges.
