Consuegra sailed from Havana for Daquiri today on board the gunboat Hato under orders of Gen. Montenegro. On arriving at Daquiri they will confer with Commander George Mitchell, of the American gunboat Paducah and inform him that the commander of the Cuban forces stationed at Daquiri has sufficient men to make unnecessary the landing of American marines.
