Ferry Receipts Increase.

The ferry figures for November show an increase in the double teams crossing in the month, as compared with the same period last year, but a drop in the single teams. The passengers numbered 176,875 as against 176,875 last year. The teams this November were: Single, 7,248, and double, and double, 1,190. November last year, 7,448, and 917, respectively. The greatest change in the classification for the months of November, 1915, and 1914, is in the militia men carried. Owing to the presence of the Army Service Corps on the West Side a year ago, the total was 7,099 to 2,866 this year. As the department, however, kept revenue from this source, the result is the same.

FAMOUS RACING NOT COMING TO STABLE GIFT TO ARRANGE LOAN FOR BELGIUM
BRITISH GOV'T

London, Dec. 2.—Colonel William Hall Walker, member of parliament, has presented to the nation his famous breeding farm for race horses at Tully, Kildare, and his training stables at Rusley Park, Wiltshire, the government undertaking to purchase the land at its own valuation.

Col. Walker's stable includes the stallions White Eagle, which won the City and Surban Handicap at Epsom in 1909 and Royal Realm, another great stake horse, and some of the most famous brood mares in the country. The valuation of the stable before the war was placed at 200,000 pounds (\$1,000,000) and had Col. Walker's offer to the government not been accepted the horses would have been sold tomorrow at Newmarket. It is estimated that even at the present time they would have brought \$500,000.

The acceptance by the government means that it intends to initiate state horse breeding as done by the governments of France, Russia and Germany. Heretofore many of the best horses in England have been sold abroad, but with the government in the market it is believed that this practice will be stopped, or at least the pick of the horses on sale will find their way to the government breeding farm.

Assessment.

The meeting of the Assessment Commission, which was to be held in their rooms on Canterbury street, this afternoon, has been postponed until next Saturday. No date has yet been decided upon as to when the representatives will take their trip to other Canadian cities and cities of Maine.

The meeting next Saturday will probably consist of the arranging of this matter.

New York, Dec. 3.—Alols Van De Vyvere, Belgian minister of finance, arrived in New York on board the White Star liner Adriatic from Liverpool.

Mr. De Vyvere said he had come to the United States to look after purchases made here for the Belgian government. He denied reports from London that he might arrange for a loan to Belgium.

Another passenger on board the Adriatic was Tod Sloan, the former American jockey, who was deported

from England, as an undesirable citizen. Sloan refused to comment on his deportation, beyond saying that he had not been given a trial.

Captain Wm. Finch, who was in command of the Arabic when she was sunk on August 19, was in charge of the Adriatic. It was his first trip since the sinking of the Arabic.
