The great mass of our citizens are watching the House and feel that the future of the province will be decided by the future of this party.

Dr. Campbell felt hurt at some of the remarks Mr. Baxter had made, and he was disappointed that plain speaking could be of advantage. W. D. Turner (Sussex) spoke eloquently in support of the attitude taken by Mr. Baxter and Mr. Jones in their loyalty to their leader, and contrasted this with the address given by St. John members. He asked if the men who had called this convention and had expressed a desire to clean house—three of them men who had voted against the present leaders—really desired to clean house. If they do, let this convention back their efforts by naming a convention committee. But, on the other hand, if the feeling of this gathering is otherwise, let this convention vote on the question of acceptance or rejection of the resignation of Mr. Murray.

It was moved by George B. Willett (Moncton) and seconded by George Dillbert (Bathurst) that Hon. J. A. Murray be chosen as leader of this party. The motion carried enthusiastically, with but few dissenting voices. Mr. Tilley called for a standing vote. This was taken, and the election of Mr. Murray was endorsed by an overwhelming majority. The only opposition coming from the city of St. John.

Mr. Slipp (Fredericton) urged that all get behind Mr. Murray and send the party to victory. He had served under Mr. Murray for years, all had conceded his personal honesty and all should be glad to follow him. Mistakes may have been made, but none of these could in any way compare with the deliberate dishonesty of the previous administration. Now Mr. Murray has taken the proper course and had stepped down, only to be accorded the unanimous support of his friends and colleagues. Mr. Murray will, with the experience he has enjoyed, be a better man than ever. There is a tendency in our party to be too thin-skinned. We are too critical of our friends. But following this magnificent convention let us get together for the good of our party and of our province. Leadership of this party is a man's job. Let us boost our leader and our Province, keep together, perfect our organization, and remove from power the most corrupt government that has ever held control.

The convention adjourned.
