Antigonish, N. S., May 17.—The largest graduation class in the history of the university was graduated from St. Francis Xavier's yesterday, when the degree of Bachelor of Arts was conferred on twenty-eight students. Four of the graduates were young lady students of Mount St. Bernard Convent, who received their degrees at a separate convocation held in the immaculate Hall of the convent last evening.

St. Francis Xavier conferred the honorary degree of LL.D. on A. G. MacDonald, Inspector of schools, Antigonish, and the honorary degree of M.A. on Alphonus Landry, professor in the Normal College in Truro, N. S. MacDonald, of Bathurst, and Miss Nellie Landry, of Moncton, were New Brunswick students to receive degrees.



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Civic Reception to be Tendered Hon. Mr. Meighen at Fredericton.

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Fifty Thousand Acres Timed to Nova Scotia Timberland Company.

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Fredericton, N. B., May 17.—A civic reception will be tendered Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, prime minister of Canada, when he visits Fredericton on Monday, May 23rd.

Arrangements for the reception are nearing completion and are in the hands of Mayor Reid and members of the city council who will take the opportunity of Right Hon. Mr. Meighen's first visit to this city since his elevation to the position of prime minister to tender him an official welcome to the capital city of New Brunswick.

The civic reception will be entirely non-political in character. An official civic delegation will meet the prime minister with a band upon arrival and escort him to the city hall, where he will be presented with an address.

Halifax, N. S., May 17.—Sale of fifty thousand acres of timber land in York-Sunbury and Digby counties, N. S., by the Fraser Pulp and Paper Company of New Brunswick to the Nova Scotia Timberland Company, Ltd., was announced today by Ralph P. Bell, of Halifax, who negotiated the transaction. Mr. Bell did not state the exact price but said that several hundred thousand dollars were involved in the sale. The timber tracts sold include all those formerly known as the Dickie and McGrath properties.

Fredericton, N. B., May 17.—The will of the late Hon. F. J. Sweeney was probated today at \$21,000. M. D. Sweeney of St. John is the sole executor. Practically all the estate consists of personal property.

SALMON BEING CAUGHT.
Fredericton, N. B., May 17.—Salmon have been caught already this season at the Hart's Island pool on the St. John River, six miles from Fredericton, thus establishing a new early record for fly fishing on the river. It is usually pretty well along in June before salmon are caught by fly fishermen on the river.

BISHOP SCORES THE GET-RICH QUICK SPIRIT

Children Join the Church at Too Young An Age Too.

BISHOP WORRELL'S SYNOD ADDRESS

Lack of Home Teaching Adds to Difficulties of the Age He Says.

Halifax, N. S., May 17.—That the get-rich-quick spirit, permeating the aspirations of the young people of today is but one manifestation of the general slackness of moral principle that is gripping humanity and destroying its vitality, was one of the statements made by Archbishop Clare Worrell in his charge to the Anglican Synod opening here this afternoon. Paraphrase please seemed to be all that counted, he declared, remarking further, "the unpaid motors which carry people away from unparaphrased churches to summer resorts which are too often regarded as escapes from religious discipline are safety valves for the pent up forces of religious indifference."

Home Teaching.
Another point which the Archbishop strongly emphasized was the necessity of supporting home institutions. It was remarkable the number of boys and girls who were sent to Ontario to schools that were not a bit better than Nova Scotia institutions.

In regard to church union, the Archbishop said that he hoped to see the day of its realization, but that those who saw in church union the elimination of all special characteristics might as well conceive of speaking without the use of any particular language.

The Archbishop then spoke of King's College and all that it meant to the life of the diocese, and urged that every member should consider it his or her duty to give it all possible support.

"I appeal to the churches of Nova Scotia, to rally to its support, and by generous gifts to place it in a position which will enable it to carry on the great work which belongs to it."

College could be carried on in the fairest manner possible without the enactment of canons and acts of parliament.

Among other important matters discussed by the Archbishop was that of communion in which he gave interesting figures to show that of almost thousand confirmations in his diocese during the past sixteen years, approximately five thousand had been apparently lost from the list of regular communicants.

This he laid to children joining the church too young, and remarked, "I would rather have a class of two or three earnest candidates than half a hundred thoughtless youngsters who are more concerned for the look of their dresses than for the privileges of the kingdom."

The Archbishop also touched upon the importance of the boy scouts' organization, social service, the need for instituting men's Bible classes and other important church work. He also touched in an interesting manner upon the history of the Lambeth conference and its bearing on the church today, as well as giving an outline of the work of the diocese during the past year. He concluded with a blessing upon both members of the Synod and their work during the year to come.

In the course of a vigorous declaration on the question of mixed marriages Archbishop Worrell said "let it be distinctly understood that mixed marriages, however undesirable they may be, are perfectly legal. I have often thought that it would be well in this new country if we could be free from the organizations which arose in the old world and marked the bitter struggles of another period, but circumstances that have recently occurred point in another direction and it will be necessary to meet organized aggression with organized opposition in some form or other."
